# Purpose of editing



Editing ensures you have a seamless piece of writing that is directly relevant to the topic and is written from a position of understanding and being able to pick out the most relevant information and write it coherently and accurately.

It makes sure that your essay does not read as a stream of consciousness or series of unconnected pieces of information.



# How to edit


Distilling clarity and ensuring that you point adds to the overall argument and matters in proportion.

Go back to your plan and consider value of what you have added.

# Is it?



Do we have the group we want and  
are they working at the same pace?



# What is editing?



Editing is:

- checking that everything reads correctly and actually says what you intend it to.
- removing superfluous words / repetition
- ensuring you have answered all parts of the question
- checking everything is relevant to overall topic
- Being focused on what you were asked to do not what you might have wanted to do

**Be ruthless!**

# What is referencing?

Referencing has 2 parts – an in text citation and the full reference details.

The in text citation indicates that a piece of information, idea or fact has been drawn from a specific named source.

The reference details give the full details of what that source is and where it can be found.

*The actual format of this does differ according to module and subject which reflects the requirements of the overall academic world.*

# Referencing is not



...a way of getting out of writing in your own words. An essay that is a string of quotations, even with a matching string of citations, is not your own work so would not be appropriate at university level.



In general it is the OU Harvard style which is maintained by the OU Library at

This follows the author's name and date convention (Henman, 2017).

One example might be to reference the recording of the 1<sup>st</sup> workshop as (Henman, 2017) and then in the final reference list.


