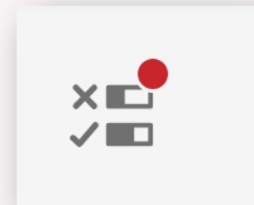
Inclusivity

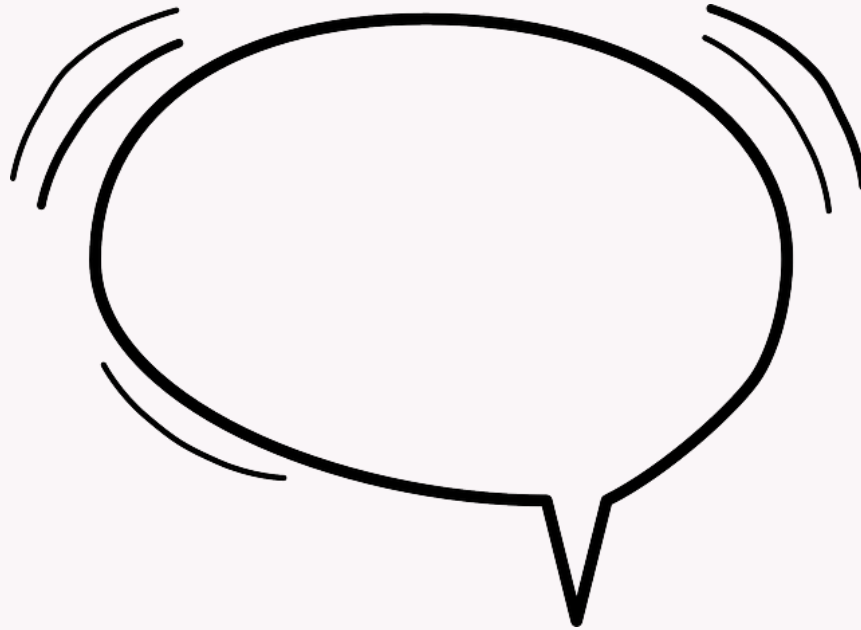
